# Ernest J. Grant, PhD, RN, FAAN

Vice Dean for Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging Duke University School of Nursing Immediate Past President- American Nurses Association (ANA)

Dr. Ernest J. Grant is the Vice Dean for Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging at the Duke University School of Nursing. He is also the immediate past president of the American Nurses Association (ANA), the nation's largest nurse's organization representing the interests of the nation's 4.3 million registered nurses. He is the first man to be elected to the office of president of the ANA in its 128 years of existence.

A distinguished leader, Dr. Grant is an internationally recognized burn-care and fire-safety expert. For the past four years in a row, Dr. Grant has been recognized by Modern Healthcare Magazine as one of 50 Influential Clinical Executives in Healthcare and as one of 100 Most Influential People in Healthcare. He has been nationally recognized for his work addressing racism, equity, and inclusion within the nursing profession. Modern Healthcare named him as one of 2023 Top Diversity Leaders.

In 2002, President George W. Bush presented Grant with a Nurse of the Year Award for his work treating burn victims from the World Trade Center site. He is a fellow of the American Academy of Nursing. Grant holds a BSN degree from NCCU and MSN and PhD degrees from the UNC-Greensboro.

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Transcultural Nursing is essential for providing quality, equitable, and respectful healthcare to diverse populations. It requires nurses to be knowledgeable, sensitive, and adaptable in their approach to care. The purpose of this presentation is to inspire and empower nurses by highlighting the unique impact of the power of the nursing profession on individuals, communities and the healthcare system across the cultures and to encourage continued engagement, leadership, and advocacy in nursing practice. This session encourages nurses to recognize their power and take actionable steps toward leadership roles.






# **Health Equity: A Global Perspective**

**Introduction:** Despite national and international initiatives, health inequities persist across the globe. Health inequities are preventable differences in the burden of disease, injury, violence, or in opportunities to achieve optimal health.

**Methodology:** This presentation focuses on three countries and begins by identifying the multifactorial reasons for health inequities. The presentation provides evidence-based recommendations for how transcultural nurses can act individually and collectively to promote health and healthcare equity.

#### Results:

In the United States, healthcare access disparities have been reported among Black, indigenous, and people of color (BIPOC), the poor, people with disabilities, and LGBTQIA+ persons. Structural racism, implicit bias, and unconscious attitudes may result in differential treatment for marginalized groups. Inequities are perpetuated by the structural socioeconomic disadvantages that BIPOC experience, with disproportionate levels of food insecurity, housing instability, hazardous exposures, and limited access to quality health care. Racial and ethnic minorities continue to be underrepresented among healthcare professionals.

In Jordan, there are significant efforts to promote equitable healthcare for vulnerable populations like refugees, low-income families, and rural communities. These include expanded healthcare infrastructure, universal vaccination programs, and improved maternal and child health services. However, disparities persist in access to healthcare between urban and rural areas, a growing burden of chronic diseases, and strains on healthcare resources due to the large refugee population. Numerous factors contribute to health inequities including socioeconomic disparities, geographical barriers, the refugee crisis, issues with healthcare infrastructure, chronic diseases and lifestyle factors, gender disparities, and gaps in health insurance coverage.

In Canada, the underlying factors are similar in that they are systemic, structural, and include discrimination at the interpersonal level with disparities noted for Indigenous Peoples, racialized communities, people with sexual and gender diversity, low income, and disabilities. However, differing contexts influence the emphasis and focus on how health inequities are addressed. The National Truth and Reconciliation Commission's call to action guides change at the policy and practice level across health care. In addition, there continues to a significant focus on Anti-Black racism and periodically, particularly post-COVID, a rise in focused recognition of Anti-Asian racism. However, despite a universal, publicly funded healthcare system, communities across Canada remain at risk for unequal access and inequitable health outcomes.

#### Discussion:

Transcultural nurses, both individually and as part of coalitions, are needed to improve health equity. Globally, they continue efforts to implement policies aimed at affordable healthcare, promote community-based health initiatives, and leverage digital health solutions. Transcultural nurses must help transform healthcare in practice and academic setting by forming broad coalitions across various disciplines and sectors of society to drive changes in public policies that affect population health. Transcultural nurses must embrace the skills of advocacy, coalition building, and working at the systems level to lead to sustainable change in outcomes. Strengthening these efforts will help ensure that all individuals, regardless of their background, can access quality healthcare and lead healthier lives.

#### Significance and relevance to the development of transcultural knowledge:

International collaboration and strong coalitions can result in improved healthcare and reduce health inequities.

# **Strategies for Improving Your Writing and Manuscript Reviews:** The Use of Reporting Guidelines and Appropriate Statistics

Introduction: Dr. Mei R. Fu, Editor-in-Chief, Journal of Transcultural Nursing

Despite the plethora of information authors would like to share, writing for publication can be a difficult and daunting task. Authors may be challenged by reduced access to resources, mentorship, and training. Additionally, writing for speakers of other languages and those with limited experience with publications face significant barriers, making it harder to meet the expectations of English-language journals and limiting opportunities to communicate valuable research findings. Submitting a manuscript always requires vulnerability as authors put their work into the world to be judged by others. The publication process itself creates barriers, with submissions, long waits, editing, and possible rejection. The critique can seem brutal and can undermine author confidence. And often, authors just don't know where to start.


A clear structure can be helpful when preparing a manuscript for potential publication. Fortunately, a variety of guidelines have been developed to assist authors. This presentation will focus on the most common types of manuscripts submitted to the Journal of Transcultural Nursing and the corresponding guidelines. The session will include: Qualitative research (SRQR Guidelines), Randomized trials (CONSORT Guideline), Observational studies (STROBE Guidelines), Systematic reviews or Scoping reviews (PRISMA Guidelines), Quality improvement studies (SQUIRE Guidelines), and Clinical practice guidelines (AGREE Guidelines).

Guidelines make writing more efficient; they help authors cover all essential information and enhance consistency in the manuscript. Authors may elect to review their manuscript based on the appropriate guideline to discover any omitted content before submitting the manuscript for formal review. These characteristics improve the chances of publication. Guidelines are also helpful for peer reviewers and editors. They provide objective criteria by which to evaluate a submission and they help reviewers provide specific, actionable suggestions to improve manuscripts. Guideline-based assessments ensure fairness across various manuscript submissions and are used to justify acceptance, revision, or rejection decisions.

The session will highlight the appropriate use and clear presentation of statistical tests as a critical component of rigorous research reporting. Participants will discover how to determine the most suitable statistical methods based on research questions, study design, and data characteristics. The presentation will provide practical strategies for transparently presenting statistical results in narrative form, tables, and figures. Emphasis will be placed on how accurate statistical reporting enhances interpretability, supports sound conclusions, and improves the quality and credibility of manuscripts. Examples from published research will illustrate best practices in statistical reporting and interpretation.
